

## From John Gruesser, PSA President

In October 2012, independent scholar and novelist S. T. Joshi gave the ninetieth annual Commemorative Edgar Allan Poe Lecture, "Poe, Lovecraft, and the Revolution in Weird Fiction," at the Enoch Pratt Free Library in Baltimore.

Look for John Jopson's independent film, *Terror*, in fall 2013. Loosely based on "The Cask of Amontillado" and set in the present day, the film was shot not far from the Tuscan church where the mummy that likely inspired Poe's story can still be seen today.
