



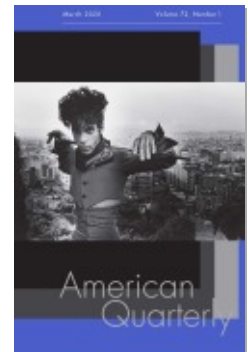

In *American Quarterly* 64.2 (June 2012), Julie Sze and Sunaina Maira's "Currents" essay, "Dispatches from Pepper Spray University: Privatization, Repression, and Revolts," stated that Linda Katehi, then chancellor of the University of California at Davis, served on the International Committee on Higher Education in Greece in 2011, producing a report that overturned the amnesty protection that had protected Greek students against policing and military violence at Greek campuses. However, the committee did not make a specific claim about amnesty or the asylum law that prevents police from entering Greek universities.
