Our focus is particularly on Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific but our conversation is international. *Labour History* also welcomes research notes and memoirs. Refereed articles should engage theoretically and empirically with workers and their workplaces, shed light on social and economic issues of significance for workers, or offer illuminating insights by taking a global, regional or transnational perspective on labouring history in any of its forms.
