

Instructions for Contributors

All submissions are accepted electronically via the new web portal (<https://oceaniclinguistics.msubmit.net>) and editorial inquiries should be addressed to the Editor, *Oceanic Linguistics*, at oceanicl@hawaii.edu.

INITIAL SUBMISSION. An anonymized electronic manuscript using the provided *Oceanic Linguistics* template is requested of all authors. All submissions should be made through our journal management system (eJournal Press), which will automatically convert manuscripts to PDF format.

FORMATTING. Authors are strongly encouraged to use the *Oceanic Linguistics* template which can be downloaded from <https://uhpress.hawaii.edu/title/ol/> or <https://oceaniclinguistics.msubmit.net>. Authors who choose not to use this template must keep formatting to an absolute minimum and the following specifications should be followed: use 10pt Times New Roman (or similar Unicode font), set the page size to 432 × 648pt (6 × 9 inches), set the inside margin at 66pt, the outside margin at 53pt. Example sentences must be set as tables with invisible borders.

TABLES & FIGURES. Figures and maps should appear in a standard graphic format (TIFF or JPEG), and should have dimensions that fit an OL page (maximum width, 26 picas or 312 pt). For the initial submission, please place tables in the body of the paper, but figures and maps should also be uploaded separately to the journal management system as image files. Tables should be typeset as tables. Tab stops and multiple sequences of spaces are prohibited.

STYLE & SPELLING. Editorial style follows The Chicago Manual of Style, 15th ed. (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2003), as implemented in current issues of *Oceanic Linguistics*. Spelling follows Webster's Third New International Dictionary of the English Language, Unabridged. Also followed are The Leipzig Glossing Rules: Conventions for interlinear morpheme-by-morpheme glosses, including the standard abbreviations listed there: <https://www.eva.mpg.de/lingua/resources/glossing-rules.php>.
