Correction

In the Fall 1987 *Preservation Forum* Resource Directory, "Sources of Funds for Historic Preservation Projects," the Department of Housing and Urban Development's Section 312 Rehabilitation Loan Program should have been listed as having funds available for both owner-occupied and commercial properties. The maximum loan amount for residential properties is \$33,500 per dwelling unit, and for non-residential properties is \$100,000. The Section 17 Rental Rehabilitation Program has funds available for rental properties on a sliding scale subsidy based on the size of the unit.
