A manuscript of approximately 6,000 to 10,000 words and an abstract of no more than 100 words should be submitted via the journal's online submission platform. Manuscripts and notation must be double-spaced with notes gathered at the end, conforming to the current edition of *The Chicago Manual of Style*.
